### Energy Academy Opens the Door to New Career Paths

Energy lies at the heart of the state, national and global economies. Energy moves cars, trucks and ships; cooks and freezes food; heats and cools our homes and workplaces; and powers industry and technology. Nothing is more central to economic growth than the availability of reliable, accessible, cost-effective energy resources. But the desire to create economic opportunities and provide a variety of affordable energy choices must be balanced with the responsibility to reduce and/or avoid adverse impacts to the environment. This responsibility should transcend political ideology and geography.

Nearly every day, we hear of pioneering research, innovative products, cutting-edge advancements, project groundbreakings, and novel policies in the energy sector. Because of these achievements, our lives are much better. But people use more energy than ever from a variety of sources and consumers' desire for sustainable energy resources will keep the pressure on to transform the energy sector. It will be key that the next generation

of workers possess the skills necessary to supply a growing population accustomed to a high standard of living with affordable, reliable, sustainable energy resources.

This week, practically in the shadow of the Grand Gulf Nuclear Generating Station, I had the pleasure of participating in the grand opening of the Claiborne County Schools District Energy Academy



program in Port Gibson. The mission of the Energy Academy is "Building a Workforce Today That Can Meet

Tomorrow's Global Challenges." Twenty incoming 9th graders are enrolled in the inaugural class. Students who complete the program will not only graduate with their high-school diploma, but will also obtain a national energy certificate and college credits. The Vicksburg-Warren School District is scheduled to begin its own Energy Academy program in 2021.

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The state's energy industry provides reliable, stable, rewarding jobs and we need a skilled, locally-trained workforce to fill those career opportunities. The Energy Academy will provide students the opportunity to learn, explore and gain handson experience that will help meet our state's and nation's future energy needs.



The way energy is produced, generated, shipped, transmitted, distributed, conserved and stored continues to evolve. I believe Mississippi is primed for an energy revolution. To get there, Mississippi will need a workforce prepared to meet the challenges and demands of the 21st century energy economy. To meet those challenges and demands and to account for the projected personnel retirements across the energy industry spectrum, programs such as the

### LAST WEEK at the MPSC

- Entergy Mississippi submitted its <u>Quarterly Report</u> for 2Q 2020 detailing Entergy Corp.'s consolidated total of assets, revenues, employees, and O&M expenses.
- $\cong$  Sierra Club filed a <u>1</u><sup>st</sup> and <u>4</u><sup>th</sup> set of data requests to MS Power Co. in regards to its <u>Reserve</u> <u>Margin Plan filing</u>. The Reserve Margin Plan evaluates the resources available to meet current energy and capacity needs among other matters.
- The MPSC retired the following dockets subject to reinstatement at the request of the applicants: 2014-AD-197 and 2015-UA-101.
- Russell Utilities and Toomsuba Water System filed a <u>Joint Petition</u> to transfer 6 customers currently served by Toomsuba Water to Russell Utilities' certificated area in Lauderdale County.
- © Oakview Utility Company filed its <u>Notice to Customers</u> to the households of the Rowan Oak Subdivision informing them that billing for sewer service will commence on September 1, 2020.

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The next Regular Docket Meeting of the MPSC is Tuesday, September 1, 2020. The meeting will be held telephonically at 10:00 am in the Commission Hearing Room in the Woolfolk State Office Building. The meeting will also be streamed live on the MPSC Webcast link.

Last week, the Central District received a total of 181 complaints from consumers against potential telemarketers through our No Call app, website and mail-ins. The top three general issues reported by consumers are related to financial loans/consolidate debt, health products/prescription drugs, and insurance.

We encourage consumers to file telemarketing complaints with the Federal Trade Commission at <a href="http://www.donotcall.gov/">http://www.donotcall.gov/</a> in addition to filing complaints with the Mississippi Public Service Commission.

These companies represent 287 complaints, approximately 574 alleged violations, and a potential \$5,460,000 in fines.

The Commission settled one case in August 2020, MPSC v. Vehicle Protection Specialists, for an undisclosed fine.
