nearly 20% of the state's workforce and contributing \$9.72 billion in farm-gate value of livestock, row crops, specialty crops and forestry production. Processing and distribution of value-added agriculture and forestry products generate another \$16.05 billion for the state's economy. The top commodities produced in Mississippi are poultry/eggs, soybeans, timber, corn, cotton, beef and catfish. Other commodities are sweet potatoes, hogs, fruits/

vegetables, rice, wheat, milk and peanuts. As far as national rankings, Mississippi is #1 in the production of catfish, #3 in sweet potatoes, #4 in cotton, #6 in both poultry and rice and #9 in peanuts. Other commodities also do quite well in the

national rankings. And you can't forget about the bounty that the Gulf of Mexico and Mississippi Sound provide in the array of fish, shrimp, crabs and oysters and the generations of fishermen that bring the catch to shore for so many of us to enjoy.



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Long before modern utilities were the norm, people had learned how to preserve, prepare and store food in ways that keep people safe and provided away-from-home dining options. But as the nation prospered, cross-country travel was made possible by the interstate system, and modern appliances and technologies allowed long-range transport of different food options. People could experience the tastes of faraway lands and cultures practically in their backyard. National Cybersecurity Strategy Released

The White House just released the long-awaited <u>National Cybersecurity Strategy</u>. This document, prepared by the Office of the National Cyber Director, builds on existing federal doctrine and sets new priorities for action. The first of these priorities is "Defend Critical Infrastructure." As a member of the NARUC Critical Infrastructure Committee, I am concerned that cyber-attacks targeting the energy sector could impact grid reliability and customer safety. While digital technological systems are now a part of life, we must evaluate cybersecurity threats and vulnerabilities and implement protections to reduce risks. The second priority of the Strategy aims to do just that: "Disrupt and Dismantle Threat Actors." However, strong objectives are only as good as the thoroughness of implementation.

Highlights from the March 7, 2023, Docket Meeting

- ☑ The Commission considered and issued an Order approving Entergy Mississippi, LLC 's Vegetation Management Rider Schedule VM-1. The VM-1 schedule was established by Commission Order in December 2019 and allows Entergy Mississippi, LLC to recover vegetation management operations and maintenance costs on a dollar -for-dollar basis, subject to annual true-up. For 2023, Entergy Mississippi, LLC has budgeted \$17.7 million for Distribution vegetation and \$3.9 million for Transmission vegetation management. Approval of the proposed budget
 - reduces an average 1,000 kWh residential customer's bill by approximately \$0.38 per month. The factor decrease is due to the over-recovery of costs compared to the prior period coupled with a decrease in projected costs during the upcoming twelve-month period.
- ☑ The Commission considered and approved an Order certifying the Auditor Findings of Entergy Mississippi Fuel Audit Reports to the Legislature in accordance with Miss. Code Ann. Section 77-3-42. The reports relate to the fuel adjustment clause of Entergy Mississippi, LLC, (EML) which is set out and contained within their rider Schedule Energy Cost Recovery ("ECR-4 (Revised)"). The Commission retained London Economics International (LEI) and HORNE LLP to carry out the Fuel Adjustment audits for the period October 1, 2021, through September 30, 2022. The two firms divided the contractual requirements with LEI being responsible for the assessment of fuel procurement practices and procedures and with HORNE being responsible for the financial audit. According to Public Utilities Staff, HORNE performed a through audit of allowable fuel and purchased energy costs. LEI found EML fuel and energy procurement processes and procedures were thorough. However, LEI did offer 16 recommendations that could be of benefit to EML and its customers.
- The Commission considered and approved an Order certifying the Auditor Findings and Certification of Mississippi Power Company Fuel Audit Reports to the Legislature in Accordance with Miss. Code Ann. Section 77-3-42. The reports relate to the fuel adjustment clause of Mississippi Power Company (MPCo), which is set out and contained within the Company Rider Schedules FCR-2 and ECM-2A. The Commission retained Forvis, LLP and Bates White to carry out the Fuel Adjustment audit for the period October 1, 2021, through September 30, 2022. The two firms divided the contractual requirements, with Bates White being responsible for the assessment of fuel and electricity procurement practices and procedures and with Forvis, LLP being responsible for the financial audit. According to Public Utilities Staff, Forvis, LLP performed a through audit of allowable fuel and purchased energy costs. Bates White found MPCo fuel and energy procurement processes and procedures were thorough. However, Bates White did offer 5 recommendations that could be of benefit to MPCo and its customers.



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☑ **The Commission** issued an <u>Order</u> Referring the Petition of **SR Marshall, LLC**, for a Facilities Certificate to Construct and Operate a Solar Electric Generating Facility in **Marshall County** to a hearing examiner for hearing, report, and recommendation of an appropriate order or any other matter necessary.

Legislation Tracker

The mid-point of the 2023 Regular Legislative session has passed and today is the deadline for floor action on general bills and constitutional amendments <u>originating out of the other house</u>. March 14 is the deadline for floor action on appropriation and revenue bills originating out of the other house. The final adoption of conference reports containing compromises of bills that passed the two chambers in differing forms for appropriation and revenue bills as well as general bills is March 27th. **House**

HB 264: Energy Efficiency standards on buildings; extend repealer on statute requiring certain buildings to meet. Passed Senate Energy Committee

<u>HB 288</u>: Public Utilities Staff; authorize certain personnel to be filled by consulting contract. Passed Senate \rightarrow Returned for Enrolling \rightarrow Enrolled Bill Signed by House

<u>HB 698</u>: Municipal water, wastewater and sewer services; require equity-based billing based on use of. *Passed Senate Energy Committee*

<u>HB 809</u>: Executive Director of Public Utilities Staff; remove Public Service Commission from the process of appointing. Passed Senate

<u>HB 1060</u>: Electric vehicles; authorize charging by non-utilities. Passed Senate \rightarrow Returned for Enrolling \rightarrow Enrolled Bill Signed by House

<u>HB 1225</u>: Telephone solicitation; bring forward provisions of law relating to. Passed Senate \rightarrow Returned for Concurrence

<u>SB 2102</u>: Impending emergency excavation; define, establish advance notice requirements and require premarking for. Passed House \rightarrow Returned for Concurrence

<u>SB 2339</u>: Provision of law establishing energy efficiency standards for building construction; extend repealer on. Passed House Energy Committee \rightarrow Returned for Concurrence

<u>SB 2341</u>: Electric transmission infrastructure; maintain state jurisdiction over integrity of. Signed by Governor

SB 2433: Regulation of public utilities; exempt distribution of water by eligible homeowners' association to its own residents from. Sent to Governor

<u>SB 2512</u>: Counties; authorize to designate ARPA funds to rural water and sewer associations for infrastructure projects. Passed House \rightarrow Returned for Concurrence

SB 2562: Transportation; allow public and private partnerships to establish electric vehicle charging stations. Signed by Governor

Appropriation, Tax, Bonds or other Funding/Revenue Bills

HB 871: Ad valorem tax; extend time for partial exemption and fee-in-lieu of ad valorem tax agreement for certain renewable energy projects. Referred to Senate Finance

SB 2698: Ad valorem tax; extend fee-in-lieu qualifying period for renewable energy project. Referred to House Ways and Means \rightarrow Concurred in Amendment from House

Please note that identification of a bill in this newsletter does not indicate support or opposition to a measure. Each bill is simply identified as an example of legislation that has been assigned to Energy, Public Utilities or other committees with oversight of these matters. Bills being tracked could change from week to week.



Last Week at the MPSC

- The Commission filed an Order issued on February 28, 2023 Referring Consolidated Hearing to Hearing Examiner in regards to Great River Utility Operating Co., LLC's Notice of Intent to Establish State-Wide Rates for Water and Wastewater Service in its Certificated Areas in the State. Great River Utility Operating Company presented Stipulations for consideration in its state-wide rate case for water systems and its statewide rate case for sewer systems. The Stipulations as presented would result in a 26% reduction from Great River's original request of \$53.75 a month for sewer service and a 16% reduction from Great River's original request of \$47.21 a month for water service. The Hearing Examiner took the Company's Stipulation and consultants' reports and recommendations under advisement and will continue to review Great River's request to establish state-wide rates.
- The Commission issued an Order Setting Supplemental Hearing in regard to Great River Utility Operating Co., LLC's the Notice of Intent to Establish State-Wide Rates for Wastewater Service in its Certificated Areas in the State. The matter has been set for a supplemental hearing on Monday, March 27, 2023, at 10:00 a.m. in the Commission Hearing Room, 1st Floor, Woolfolk State Office Building, 501 N. West Street, Jackson.
- Hinds Solar, LLC filed its Petition for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity for the construction and operation of a 150 MW_{AC} solar photovoltaic electric generation facility and an option to construct up to 150 MW battery energy storage system in Hinds County. The entire electrical output generated by the Project will be sold to Entergy Mississippi, LLC under a PPA with a term of 20 years. The Project was selected as a part of Entergy Mississippi's 2022 Request for Proposals, which solicited 500 MWs of renewable resources across their service area. The capital investment in Mississippi necessary to develop and construct the Project is estimated to be approximately \$150,000,000 or above. A new and significant source of income will be realized by participating landowners. The Project has signed a Fee in Lieu of Taxes agreement with the County and will serve as a new and significant source of revenue for the community. Hinds Solar must commence operations by December 2024.
- The following regulated utilities have filed their Annual Reports as required by the Hire Mississippi Rule: Entergy Mississippi, LLC; Atmos Energy Corporation
- Atmos Energy Corporation filed its Notice of Intent in the Matter of a Comprehensive Review of Atmos Energy Corporation's Proposed Capital Budget for Fiscal Year 2024. The filing reflects the agreement between the Public Utilities Staff and Atmos Energy that Staff has a duty to review and make a recommendation to the Commission regarding all capital projects proposed by Atmos on an annual basis. The Joint Stipulation further reflects that Staff must be able to verify the projected level of spending, determine the reasonableness of the projected level of spending and the fact that the project was completed within the timeframe proposed, and is being used and is useful in rendering gas service. To allow Staff to fulfill this duty, Staff and Atmos Energy agreed to an annual procedure by which Atmos Energy, by March 1 of each year, will make its System Integrity Rider filing with Staff. The filing provides descriptive detail and the type of capital projects proposed for the coming year.
- Entergy Mississippi, LLC filed its 2023 Formula Rate Plan for the twelve-month period ending December 31, 2023 ("2023 Evaluation Report"), along with the Company's look-back for the twelve-month period ended December 31, 2022 ("2022 Look-back"). The filing provides information for the Public Utilities Staff to conduct a review of the Company's expenses, capital accounts (rate base), revenues, and operational performance for the twelve-month period ended December 31, 2022, and determine whether and how much of a rate adjustment is appropriate. The filing lays out grid modernization investments, storm-related costs, demand-side management activities and other programs, as well as infrastructure improvements and investments.
- Cocelot Solar, LLC filed its Petition for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity for the construction, ownership, and operation of an approximate 100 MW solar electric generation facility in Sharkey County. Ocelot Solar, LLC will sell the entire electric generation output of the Facility, at wholesale, into the interstate electricity market of Midcontinent Independent System Operator ("MISO") through an interconnection with Entergy Mississippi. The capital investment necessary to develop and construct the Facility is estimated to be approximately \$120 million, resulting in a taxable value that will generate significant ad valorem tax revenue to Sharkey County and the local school district. Construction is estimated to take 21-24 months, dependent on weather, and is expected to commence operations in December 2026.



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- ☐ Half Step Solar, LLC filed its Petition for Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity Authorizing Construction, Ownership, and Operation of a Solar Electric Generating Facility in Tunica County. Half Step Solar is a 150MW project consisting of single axis tracker solar panels. There is room for future expansion depending on the Tunica Mega Site. Construction is forecasted to begin in August 2024 and is estimated to take 21-24 months and commence operations in December 2026. The capital investment to construct the Facility is estimated to be approximately \$170 million, and the resulting taxable value will create significant ad valorem tax revenue to Tunica County and the local school district. The Facility intends to sell wholesale energy, and potentially other project attributes, to one or more off takers pursuant to a power purchase agreement at rates competitive with traditional resources. The project will provide direct and indirect economic benefits to the state, county, and surrounding area in the form of taxes (sales and ad valorem), jobs, and related ancillary economic impacts.
- The Commission issued a <u>Suspension Order</u> in regards to Notice of Intent of the Town of Brooksville to Change Rates for Water Service In Its Certificated Area In **Noxubee County**.
- Entergy Mississippi, LLC filed its <u>Submittal</u> of Annual <u>Distributed Generation Reports</u> and <u>Distributed Generation Interconnection Reports</u> in accordance with the requirements of the Distributed Generation Rule.
- Mississippi Power Company filed its 2023 Mid-Point Supply Side Update to the Company's 2021 Integrated Resource Plan. A list of the documents utilized to support and inform Mississippi Power Company's Mid-Point Supply-Side Update is listed below:

The Update to is meant describe any material changes to the Integrated Resource Plan, including material changes in economic assumptions (e.g., future natural gas price forecasts or alternative technology costs), environmental rules and regulations, regional transmission organization rules, or forecasted load requirements." In the Update, **Mississippi Power Company** has identified significant assumption changes to its 2021 Integrated Resource Plan (IRP).

- ☐ Intrado Safety Communications, Inc. filed its Notice of Consummation that the indirect transfer of control of Intrado Safety Communications, Inc., was consummated on January 31.
- The Commission issued a <u>Second Order of Continuance</u> in regards to the **Siwell Utility Co., Inc.** and **Rolling Hills Wastewater, Inc.** Show Cause Hearing Determining Whether Respondents Are In Violation of Certain Statutes Governed by the Commission.
- Holmes County Landowners filed <u>Comments</u> in opposition to the proposed Supplemental Petition by Southern Spirit Transmission LLC for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity for the Proposed Southern Spirit Transmission Project.
- Mississippi Power Company filed its Notice initiating its second Integrated Resource Planning and Reporting cycle to be conducted in accordance with Rule 29. Additionally, Mississippi Power Company filed its Notice of Initial Public Workshop to interested parties pursuant to the Commission's Rule 29. Mississippi Power Company proposes to conduct its Initial Public Workshop on Friday, March 31, 2023, between the hours of 9:00am and 12:00pm, in Jackson, MS.



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Gulf States Renewable Energy Industry Association filed its Motion to Intervene regarding the Notice of Mississippi Power Company to Establish a Solar for Schools Rate Schedule.

Our Pipeline Safety Division completed 3 construction inspection in the Central District during the month of February.



The total amount of construction notices that were received by the Commission in the Central District during the month of February is approximately \$722,000.

"Reporting of Construction Work"- The rule is found in Chapter 57.1: All Construction work involving gas facilities in which the estimated cost of proposed facilities is in excess of eight thousand dollars are related facilities that would be governed by the Federal Minimum Safety Requirements, will be reported in writing, or via telephone to the MS Public Service Commission prior to starting date of such construction. (There are exceptions for emergencies.)

The Commission encourages all intra-state natural gas operators to comply with the rule.
