Federal Trade Commission Reports Top Scams of 2022

Each year, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) provides an overview of the prior year's millions of reports about fraud, scams and bad business practices. So, what were scammers up to in 2022? According to the FTC, scammers took a LOT of money from consumers in 2022. The latest FTC data book says people reported losing \$8.8 billion to scams. That's \$2.6 billion more than 2021.



Some of the top scams in 2022 include investment scams, sweepstakes scams, job scams and impersonator scams. Additionally, the biggest reported losses were through bank transfers and cryptocurrency. Interestingly, younger adults (ages 20-29) reported losing money more often than older adults (ages 70-79). However, when older adults did lose money, they lost more than anyone else on an individual basis.

Of the 2,369,527 reports of fraud, 1,441,424 reported the method by which consumers were contacted. Consumers were contacted by text message 22% of the time and were contacted by phone call 20% of the time. The total amount of dollar lost through text message and phone scams was \$1.124 billion. Consumers who were contacted by phone scammers reported the highest median losses at \$1,400 per person. Scams that occurred over social media raked in the most money from consumers at \$1.228 billion.

Mississippi ranked number 27th (fraud reports per 100K population) with a total of 25,984 in fraud and other reports received by the FTC in 2022. There were a total of \$22.9 million in fraud losses and \$500 was the median amount of those fraud losses. Mississippi also ranked 10th in the nation in identity theft reports.

While the Mississippi Public Service Commission takes "do not call" complaints from citizens every day, people can also file a complaint with the FTC through the [National Do Not Call Registry](https://www.ftc.gov/identity-theft). In 2022, 15,689 complaints were filed with 9,478 of the culprits reported to be robocalls.

Protect yourself from scams! Be alert to the fact that scams exist. Scams succeed because they look like the real thing and catch you off guard when you're not expecting it. And scammers are getting smarter, more savvy and utilizing new technologies to convince you to give them your money or personal details. Scams target people of all backgrounds, ages and income levels. Be alert, know who you are dealing with, protect your personal information and if it looks too good to be true, it probably is!



Energy News

Entergy Mississippi Installs Advanced Circuit Breaker

Entergy Mississippi recently completed the installation of only the second U.S. dead-tank BLUE Circuit Breaker in the country at one of its substations in Vicksburg. What's more, the BLUE 123kV High-Voltage Circuit Breaker was manufactured in Richland, MS by Siemens Energy. The BLUE Circuit Breaker uses a clean air mix of 80% nitrogen and 20% oxygen for its insulating medium rather than oil and sulfur hexafluoride, a potent greenhouse gas.

Electricity Production and Delivery Costs Puts Pressure on Rates

For the last several years, electricity production costs have remained steady or declined as natural gas prices fell and low cost renewable generators came online. The costs to produce electricity generally includes the money spent to build, operate, fuel and maintain power plants as well as to purchase electricity from other generators and energy markets. Costs are also impacted by fluctuations in price of capital, labor, materials and fuels.

The costs to deliver electricity includes money spent to build, operate and maintain the substations, wires, poles, towers and meters that make up the transmission and distribution infrastructure. Utilities have been generally increasing spending on its electric delivery system to replace aging equipment, expand transmission infrastructure and install new technologies that increase grid efficiency, reliability, resilience and security.

Inflation, supply chain woes, inputs costs, labor market and shifting customer preference will continue to influence rates and bills. Other costs such as administrative expenses, buildings, taxes and general expenses have to be accounted for as well. The Commission consistently reviews these costs, adjusts on an annual basis and works with utilities to implement just and reasonable rates.

Legislation Tracker

The mid-point of the 2023 Regular Legislative session has passed and March 8 is the deadline for floor action on general bills and constitutional amendments originating out of the other house. March 14 is the deadline for floor action on appropriation and revenue bills originating out of the other house. The final adoption of conference reports containing compromises of bills that pass the two chambers in differing forms for appropriation and revenue bills as well as general bills is March 27th. The Commission is watching numerous bills that could impact customers, certain utilities or the MPSC. This week we update their status.

Great River UOC Water and Sewer Rates Hearing

On Monday, February 27, 2023, at 10:00 a.m., the Commission held a Public Hearing regarding the Notices of Intent of Great River Utility Operating Company, LLC to Establish State-Wide Rates for Water and Wastewater Services in Its Certificated Areas in the Commission Hearing Room on the 1st Floor of the Woolfolk State Office Building. This hearing was reserved for public comments and individuals from Hinds and Warren County were present to make their comments on the record. The individuals represented residents of Lafayette County and Warren County.



The Commission then held an Evidentiary Hearing on Tuesday, February 28, 2023, at 10:00 a.m., regarding the Notices of Intent of Great River Utility Operating Company, LLC to Establish State-Wide Rates for Water and Wastewater Services in Its Certificated Areas in the Commission Hearing Room, in which Great River Utility Operating Company presented Stipulations for consideration in its state-wide rate case for water systems and its state-wide rate case for sewer systems. The Stipulations as presented would result in a 26% reduction from Great River's original request of \$53.75 a month for sewer service and a 16% reduction from Great River's original request of \$47.21 a month for water service. The Commission took the Company's Stipulation and consultants' reports and recommendations under advisement and will continue to review Great River's request to establish state-wide rates.



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The following sewer systems in the following counties in the Central District will be impacted if approved:

- **Warren County:** Brookwood Place Subdivision; Camden Place Subdivision; Fairways Subdivision; Forest Cove Subdivision; Leland Pointe Subdivision; Openwood Plantation; Pecan Village Subdivision; Pine Woods MHP; Ring Road Subdivision; Silver Leaf Development; The Grove Subdivision; The Trace Subdivision
- **Lauderdale County:** King Farms Subdivision
- **Hinds County:** Ridge Park; Wakeland Hills; and Wildwood Subdivisions



Last Week at the MPSC

- ☞ **City of Brooksville** filed their [Notice of Intent](#) to Increase Water Rates for Service in its Certified Area in **Noxubee County** from \$16.20 to a minimum monthly charge of \$18.20 per month, which includes 0-2000 gallons of usage for residential and commercial customers. The total customers impacted by the increase are 1069. **City of Brooksville** also filed its [Notice to Customers](#) of its change in rates from \$16.20 for 0-2000 gallons to the proposed rate of \$18.20 for 0-2000 gallons.
- ☞ **Cooperative Energy** filed its [Petition](#) for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity to authorize it to construct, maintain and operate a new single circuit 115 kV transmission line, to rebuild two existing 115 kV transmission lines, to construct two new 115 kV 3-way GOAB switches, and to construct two new 115 kV switching stations on existing and new right-of-way in **Walthall, Lincoln, and Pike Counties**. The estimated cost of the transmission lines, switching stations, and facilities is expected to be approximately \$21,749,000.
- ☞ **The Commission** issued its [Order Canceling](#) Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity for **Big River Telephone Company, LLC** approving its request to voluntarily relinquish its Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity to provide competitive resold and facilities-based local exchange telecommunications services and to withdraw all tariffs on file in the State since the Company does not provide telecommunications services to any customer in the State and has no plans to do so.
- ☞ **Great River Utility Operating Co. LLC** filed its Stipulations for [Water Service](#) and [Wastewater Disposal Service](#) in regards to its Notice of Intent to Establish State-Wide Rates for both in Its Certificated Areas in the State. In both its Water and Wastewater Stipulations, **Great River Utility Operating Co. LLC** stipulated to the following:
 - A rate mitigation plan to address rate shock.
 - No further adjustments to the rate base or expenses.
 - Revise its Formula Rate Plan to provide the **Public Utilities Staff** eighty days to review the Company's Formula Rate Plan Annual Filing.
 - Supplement the list of filing requirements in the Formula Rate Plan.
 - Revise the [Formula Rate Plan](#) to provide for interim rates, subject to refund, and permanent rates following **Commission** approval incorporating any necessary calendar-year surcharge or refund.
 - Amendments to its Schedule of Service Charges and Fees to remove certain bank and credit card fees and including such costs in its annual cost of service, and
 - Various amendments to their Service Rules and Regulations to improve the customer's ability to understand and comply with them.
- ☞ **The Commission** issued its [Recommended Order](#) Granting the Supplemental Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity authorizing **Yokena-Jeff Davis Water District Inc.** to construct, operate, and maintain a water distribution system within a specified area of **Warren County**.



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- Yokena-Jeff Davis desires to install approximately 6,200 linear feet of 6-inch PVC water main along Burnt House Road in Warren County to serve existing and future customers in the revised Certificated Area, after having received requests for water service from various property owners.
- ✎ **Southern Spirit Transmission, LLC** filed its [Amended Certificate of Notification](#) in regards to its Petition for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity for the Proposed Southern Spirit Transmission Project.
 - ✎ **Great River Utility Operating Co., LLC** its Verification of Notice for [Water Service](#) and [Wastewater Disposal Service](#) in regards to publication of its Notice of Intent to Establish State-Wide Rates for Water Service in its Certificated Areas.
 - ✎ **Cooperative Energy** filed its [Net Metering and Interconnection Rule Report](#) for the Year 2022 in accordance with the Order Establishing Docket to Investigate the Development and Implementation of Net Metering Programs and Standards.

I had the privilege of joining members of the CenterPoint Energy foundation Monday afternoon for two check presentations. We started off at the Mississippi Children's Museum (pictured above) to present a \$20,000 check in support of the institution's Read to Succeed summer camp that prepares students to successfully pass and/or improve their scores of the 3rd Grade Summative Reading Assessment, promoting them to the 4th grade. The program consists of nearly 100 students from the Jackson Public Schools and this summer will be their third year since their initial start-up.



The second check presentation took place at the Bridge Builders Leadership Initiative (pictured above) after-school (6th-12th grade) program site in the Pearl Parks and Recreation Building. The CenterPoint Energy foundation contributed \$21,755 which provided 11 iPad with STEM learning apps and additionally will help expand their program allowing them to provide more support to low and moderate families in need of hot meals, school supplies and other assistance such as workforce development.
